



## *Father Sam's Forum*

If you come to the Vigil Mass this weekend, you will hear a different set of readings than the people who come to worship on Sunday. That's because we bring our RCIA group for what is known as the First Scrutiny at this celebration. The Church always uses the readings from Year A when people are being prepared to enter the Church at Easter because these readings are baptismal in nature and foundational to entering the Church.

Our regular Year B cycle contains two familiar scriptures, the giving of the commandments from the Book of Exodus, and Jesus' response to the moneychangers in the Temple from John's gospel. Coupled with the short passage from Paul's first epistle to the Christians at Corinth, these readings are about signs.

It was the fidelity of Israel to the covenant that was established between them and God that was a sign to other nations. A way to live out that covenant was to keep the commandments. God's message in that Exodus text says that God is jealous. What exactly does that mean? How can God be jealous? Isn't jealousy something negative?

The context of the readings indicates that God is zealous for the people, that is, possessive of them like a parent for her children. On behalf of His people, God has done marvelous deeds, such as bringing them through the Red Sea. It is this zeal for the chosen people that makes God continue to offer them renewal in the covenant relationship, even when they fail to uphold their part.

How have we upheld the covenant relationship God made with us? In our baptism, we were claimed as God's own people, daughters and sons who were born again of water and the Spirit. The ultimate sign of this relationship is the cross. Jesus embraced the cross for us, for our salvation. He is the Temple not made by human hands that is raised up after three days. The cross becomes a stumbling block for some and absurdity to others. Can we see its true meaning?

The Church continues today as the sign of our relationship with God. We come to the church—the building, this sacred space—because we are the Church—the Body of Christ. What sign do we give in our homes, our places of work, our neighborhoods, that we follow a Lord whose power lies in humility and sacrifice?

**A Word About Holy Week...**next weekend we will include the schedule for Holy Week with details about the services of this special week in our spiritual life. A heads up to everyone about the liturgy on April 5, Palm Sunday. The 12:30pm Mass that day will begin with a procession that forms in O'Brien Hall. The instruction for the liturgy indicates that at one Mass people gather outside the church and conduct the introductory rites there before walking in procession to the church for the reading of the Passion and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. This action calls to mind the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem before his death. All who are able will be asked to gather in the hall and participate in this procession. Also, **note that on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday there will be no 6:00pm Mass.**

## Lesson of the Week

**Why does the Church begin Lent with ashes?**

Ashes have been a sign of sorrow and mourning from biblical times. In the early Roman Church, when Lent was a time for the reconciliation of public penitents, those to be readmitted to the sacraments would come to the church at the beginning of Lent—that is, on Ash Wednesday. They would wear some kind of garment that was penitential, recalling the sackcloth of the bible for those in mourning or doing penance. They would also be sprinkled with ashes. Then, ritually expelled from the assembly, they would go home to do their penance for 40 days, returning to the church on Holy Thursday, when they would be permitted to receive the sacraments. Over time, this public penance disappeared, but the ashes remained and became the call for all baptized Roman Catholics to do penance during the season of Lent. The Greek Church never adopted this ritual.

What is it about those ashes that draws so many people to come to church and be marked as Lent begins? Coupled with the readings of Ash Wednesday, the ashes are clearly a sign that those who receive them will make every effort to keep the season and undergo the discipline of the season. Many clergy tire of those who come for what has become known as “ash and dash,” that frantic running in for the ashy smudge without the hearing of the word of God to which it is so closely connected. It makes no sense to want the mark but not the responsibility that it demands. Why bother to receive the ashes but not find the time to listen to the readings, or, when the ashes are given in the context of the Mass as is the preferred ritual, stay for the Eucharist? While only God can judge the interior disposition, the dash to the minister imposing the ashes can seem like magic instead of a thoughtful reflection on the call to turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel.

The season of Lent asks a response from those who are baptized. That response asked of us is to keep the season through the traditional means of prayer, fasting and works of charity. If we aren't finding extra time for prayer, or keeping some kind of fast from our regular routines, or reaching out to others in charity, we deprive ourselves of the spiritual benefit of this sacred time. “Everyone is so busy,” is the reason heard so often, but that becomes an easy excuse for continuing to rush through life instead of slowing down and savoring the moment. If we are too busy, what should we eliminate? Lent is the time to stop.

## Parish Trip to Italy

We still have room to take a few more travelers on our parish pilgrimage to the shrines of St. Benedict and a visit to the Tuscan countryside in October. Fr.
